# **Background**

Learning and adaptive management of projects has inherently become mainstreamed within development projects today. This is largely advocated with a view of shifting the culture traditional monitoring and evaluation that has literally tended to focus on 'counting the beans' without deliberate feedback loops for system improvement. Further, learning adaptive management of projects is being promoted because it also addresses the challenges associated with project management where projects find it difficult extracting, distributing, and applying learning across both cultural and structural boundaries thereby limiting the potential of exploiting the generated knowledge. Accordingly, there's now a popular saying that "organisations are either learning or they are dying" because learning is a process that enriches knowledge, and knowledge is the capacity for effective action.

Owing to the complexity and uncertain nature of development and humanitarian needs, systematic, integrative and collaborative processes in program design, data gathering and information dissemination as well as interpretation and learning process that support evidence-based decision making, adaptation, flexibility and innovative delivery of actions are required. It is thus common that most development projects and/or programs developed today whether by civil society and/or higher education institutions are required to provide an actional learning and adaptation plan (LAMP). However, for most of the institutions and/or project partners, the LAMP is often developed for compliance rather than for improving internal and external processes for program success. Where bits and pieces of it are deployed, there is strong compartmentalization into 'lessons' or 'success stories' and fall short of addressing the comprehensive learning needs among diverse stakeholders involved in the program delivery.

The result of such patterns is that learning is reduced to be a preserve of a few individuals in the organization often attributed to monitoring, evaluation and learning officers or directorates and/or directly involved project teams. This undermines the functionality of learning as an instrument for driving social change and impact arising from program interventions. Yet, information and feedback from various actor groups is critical in triggering actions towards improving services and driving engagement pathways that strengthen accountability and mutual respect. Given the collaborative nature of several development actions today with the involvement of citizens at various levels through engaged communities, it opens avenues for feedback, learning and adaptation for action because without action, no learning would have taken place. However, it is critical to note that what is actionable may vary within and between stakeholders including individuals and institutions. This may be influenced by how information is processed; it is transmitted and how it is received.

Across all Mastercard Foundation partnerships, the learning and adaptive management plan is an important imperative and partners are often encouraged to use the LAMP in their processes and operations. Therefore, this session seeks to bring together higher education collaboratives explore

the various ways they have listened, documented, learnt, unlearned and are relearning to derive relevant information to guide their programming actions.
